## Your Giving Saves Lives: Three Lives in the Balance

hen Celina Lemon and her husband, Juan found out that Celina was pregnant with two baby girls, they were overjoyed. Over the first 31 weeks, Celina's pregnancy went smoothly. But in the 32nd week, Celina woke up feeling dizzy with a severe headache.

Juan immediately called 911. Celina was rushed to our Nan and Howard Schow Emergency & Trauma Center. "I was terrified for her and our babies," recalls Juan.

Within minutes of her arrival, Celina was in cardiac arrest — endangering both her and her unborn children.

With three lives hanging in the balance, Huntington's emergency medicine physician Maria Ximena Vargas Jaramillo, MD, called on more than 25 caregivers across three departments to deliver the babies right away, and a Huntington OB GYN performed a cesarean section in the emergency department. The babies were quickly moved to our neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) for additional care.

Meanwhile, Celina's condition was deteriorating and she was rushed to the operating room.


#### **CANCER CARE**

Sherry and David Kirchheimer recently made a tribute gift to honor him and his beloved wife, Weta, for their invaluable contributions to our mission of medical excellence. Sherry, a family nurse practitioner, did her training at Huntington, while David had been a board member here since 2009.

The main board room that Dr. Mathies created as president is now named the Mathies Board Room. David and Sherry were gratified that Dr. Mathies knew of the gift and naming in his honor shortly before his death in February 2023, at the age of 92.

"The doctors didn't know if Celina would wake up again," says Juan. "I was thinking about how Celina might never have a chance to meet her girls and how I wasn't ready to lose the love of my life."

Miraculously, the next morning, Celina woke up, marking the start of a long recovery. At our acute inpatient rehabilitation department, she slowly relearned basic tasks, like talking and eating, and skills she would need as a mother of newborns.

Camila and Ciena spent five weeks in the NICU before going home. Two weeks later,

Celina went home, too, and transitioned to an intensive in-home therapy program,
